- Reduced number of PhDs teaching in UP





Common Constraints / Problems

- Lack of motivation for pursuing a research career – finishing a PhD is not required for faculty members and does not imply a dramatic increase in salary.
- The lack of awareness of new methodologies in research and teaching (digital tools, e.g., LMS, MOOCs).

Common Constraints / Problems

Difficulty of accessing original materials

- Rare periodicals kept in selected universities in the Philippines usually requires physical access (no digital copy)
- Rare materials are usually accessible only in microforms
- Originals are sometimes in very poor state and physical access is not encouraged
- Catalog or index not available online

Common Constraints / Problems

- Lack of digital resources, infrastructure, and facilities to access these resources online (e.g, digital humanities platforms, digital tools).
- Internet speed in the Philippines is relatively slow, affecting access to digital resources.

Archive Content

- streaming of video recordings of performances or documentaries on cultural spectacles;
- galleries of photographs;
- performance notations (for dance), performance scripts (for theater), historical notes (for cultural spectacles);
- an authoritative bibliography of scholarly materials on Philippine performance history.

Philippine Cultural Performances archive explores cultural activities in the Philippines where Filipino communities dramatize their collective narratives in rituals, festivals and spectacles.






Philippine Dance aims to complement the works done in the field of dance by collating the existing works with video recordings of performances accompanied by descriptions, photographs and notations.

Philippine Theater archive provides access to audio-visual and print materials of performances along with scholarship and criticism on Philippine theater.









